Thousands Off The BPL Grid

The number of people who have fallen behind in paying their electricity bill and have consequently had their power cut off is in the thousands.

This matter according to Minister of Works Desmond Bannister warrants serious concern.

An island by island look at the figures show that in Abaco, there were 58 customers with a total balance of \$64, 822 owed to Bahamas Power and Light (BPL).

In Acklins, 14 customers are off the grid after a balance of \$36,353; in Bimini, the number of disconnected BPL consumers sit at 85, with a \$136,040 balance.

In Cat Island, 66 customers, have a balance of \$34,342.

Over in Central Andros, 166 customers translated into \$153,458,

and Crooked Island, six, on the books, \$13,265.

"In Eleuthera 88, balance of \$113,778.75, in Exuma 14 with a balance of \$8,180.85, in Great Harbour Cay there were 11, \$9,349.10.

"In Inagua there were

52, \$311,200.15, in Mangrove Cay there were 19 with \$11,840.85," he said.

"In New Providence there were 4,639, not 6,000, with a balance of \$4,275,990.65"

The list goes on for a

grand total of 5,412 BPL consumers, the dollar figure \$5.3 million.

"The very real question that we as legislators, and we as policy-makers have to decide, is what do you do about persons in that situation,"

he said.

"Because the utility (BPL) as you see, can't afford it and they keep on drafting up and more receivables," he added.

"And then you know that the people are hurting and they need to be

able to get back on the grid to have power now-days."

Minister Bannister strongly advised all those serious about their electricity bills to ensure energy audits are conducted.

some time or another, experienced unfortunate situations and trauma is a normal reaction," he said.

"However, when the effects are so severe that they interfere with a person's ability to live a normal life, professional help is needed to restore the

state of emotional well-being," he added.

The Minister asserted that a trauma informed community must begin with stakeholders who should be aware of and able to identify factors that trigger trauma in at-risk youth, as many fall into this category.

"Rape, domestic vio-

lence, bullying, emotional abuse, physical abuse, community violence, the death of a loved one or just witnessing an act of violence.

"With that short, but not exhaustive list, it's safe to say that the entire generation of young people could be at risk because the entire generation have

been exposed to one or more of these things."

Minister Campbell reminded the attendees that they should take responsibility in helping at risk youth because they are all their children.

The one-day symposium took place at the National Training Agency (NTA), Gladstone Road.

"Well, I do have concerns about it simply because of what we have seen happen so far.

"A lot of it has been illegal activity, there's a process involved in expressing your grievances and unfortunately teachers haven't utilized the agreed protocols around that, so we do have concerns about it.

"Do we think it should

be something that should happen based on all the efforts we are making? No, we don't think it should happen, but we will have to see," he said.

So far, students have lost some 50,000 learning hours and according Mr. Taylor, if teachers do move forward with a strike, the effect would be devastating for the students.

"The department would not only be sad-

dened by it, but we would be making all efforts to try to see what we can do.

"The truth is that we are limited, we don't have a pool of teachers just sitting around waiting for us to call them in if some teachers decide to withdraw their labour.

"Of course whatever actions they take, then we will have to do whatever we have to do to first and foremost to ensure that students coming to school

are safe; secondly, that they are provided with some form of education in the interim and thirdly, deal with the Human Resource matters as we can," he said.

The Education Director added that the ministry met with the union just yesterday and anticipates that this situation will come to a smooth end.

"On the 9th of this month we had a meeting with the union, and at that

time we made the point clear that we expected the teachers to return to work.

"We also made some commitments that we would address certain matters and so what we did in that meeting yesterday was to provide an update on where we are with all the developments," he said.

Meantime, Mr. Taylor said the department is doing everything they can

to make that school safe and comfortable.

This after The Bahamas Union of Teachers (BUT) announced that a letter requesting a strike vote has been sent to the Minister of Labor, marking the first step towards industrial action.

The union is now awaiting a response from the Ministry in terms of when and if it can take a strike poll.

Minnis Addresses Economic Empowerment Zone Act at Town Hall Meeting

“We are all our brothers’ keepers”, Prime Minister Dr. the Most Hon. Hubert A. Minnis told residents during an Over-the-Hill Community Development Partnership Initiative town hall meeting.

The series of dialogue with residents in the target areas focused on the Economic Empowerment Zone Act, 2018 and the concessions therein, during the meeting held at the Grants Town Wesley Methodist Church on Baillou Hill Road and Meadow Street on Wednesday, November 28, 2018.

The Prime Minister’s remarks were reminiscent of his childhood upbringing; growing up in a clean and safe environment though poor.

It was in May 2018 that the White Paper on the Over-the Hill Community Development Partnership Initiative was introduced to the public in a town meeting at the landmark Bethel Baptist Church.

The Initiative calls for policy objectives for the rejuvenation of the historic Over-the-Hill Community. It has six key pillars, designed to fully restore the lives of residents.

These areas include:
Social Empowerment;
Economic Empowerment;
Rejuvenation;
Smart Technology;
Green and Sustainable

Technology; and Programmes for the Youth and the Elderly.

In addition, at the latest town meeting business owners, renters and home owners got information about one of the key components of the Government’s plan to restore the Over-the-Hill community.

Technical officers from the Ministry of Finance and Planning headed by Financial Secretary Marlon Johnson outlined a comprehensive strategy to improve the economic conditions of the Over-the-Hill community and similar economically depressed communities. Shared were:

Tax concessions to help businesses offered under the Economic Empowerment Zone Act, 2018;
Presentations on Environmental Monitors
Presentation on the Rent Control Act
Exemptions related to Economic Empowerment Act

An overview of other available concessions and how residents can apply under for the Economic Empowerment Zone Act
Samita Ferguson, Executive Manager of the Over-the-Hill Unit in the Office of the Prime Minister gave a presentation on the Over-the-Hill Initiative.

“My Government is committed to restoring

the Over-the-Hill community, and other communities experiencing economic hardship, to their glory days,” the Prime Minister said, adding that there has been no significant change in about 50 years.

He said however that the changes cannot be done in one year but “as long as I am here, this party (FNM) will continue along this road.”

Sharing more of his childhood days, the Prime Minister recalled his shining shoes through Hospital Lane and Meeting Street and then worked as a pump attendant at his father’s gas station, Minnis Service Station.

He stated that he and Member of Parliament for Centreville Reece Chipman might disagree on some things but they do speak with one voice when it comes to changing the environment and the quality of life for Bahamians.

In this vein, The Economic Empowerment Zone Act, 2018 allows the Government to offer significant tax concessions on duty, real property tax, stamp tax and excise tax to businesses in areas experiencing economic hardship, poverty and high crime, among other measures.

The designated areas for the zone are Delancy Street North, to Wulff Road South and Nassau Street West to Collins

Wall in the East.

Other areas will be zoned in similar fashion. Those areas are Englerston, Kemp Road, Fox Hill, Rock Crusher, Gambier and other pockets of poverty, the Prime Minister said.

“We are trying to

bridge the gap,” he said.

Already, the Southern Recreation Grounds is being prepped for redevelopment. Some 50 residents are also expected to be hired by Christmas 2018.

“Your job is to keep it clean. As we do our jobs,

you do your jobs. We want a healthy environment,” the Prime Minister admonished.

Donors have pledged support of the redevelopment project, most recently Albany with \$600,000 in two instalments.

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THE BAHAMAS AND INDIA STRENGTHEN RELATIONS WITH DIPLOMATIC VISA WAIVER AGREEMENT



The Ministry of Foreign Affairs of the Commonwealth of The Bahamas is pleased to announce that, during a short ceremony held at the Ministry in Nassau, the Minister of Foreign Affairs, the Honourable Darren A. Henfield, MP, and the Indian High Commissioner to The Bahamas, His Excellency Mude Sevala Naik, signed today, Thursday, 29 November 2018, a Visa Waiver Agreement between the Commonwealth of The Bahamas and the Republic of India for holders of their diplomatic and official passports. This arrangement allows for Bahamian and Indian officials to enter the territory of the other party without the need of a visa.

This agreement facilitates the travel required in the growing talks between

the two Commonwealth States, which established bilateral diplomatic relations in 1975.

Following the ceremony, Minister Henfield and High Commissioner Naik took the opportunity to discuss matters of mutual interest, including on the progress made with respect to the implementation of the Visa Facilitation arrangement that allows Indian nationals in possession of a Canadian, Schengen, UK or US visa to enter and visit The Bahamas without the need for a visa. Other matters addressed were technical assistance and membership in international bodies.

Chinese Embassy Donates to Bahamas Feeding Network

The People's Republic of China is helping to feed the needy in the Bahamian community with a generous food donation to the Bahamas Feeding Network (BFN).

The Embassy purchased \$3,000 worth of food from local wholesalers on BFN's behalf. The gift, which comes in the wake of Thanksgiving, placed a smile on the face of Executive Director Philip Smith who said it would go a long way in helping society's most

underprivileged.

"The food supplies are sufficient for 1,750 meals which will go toward helping to feed the more than 40,000 persons who do not know where their next plate of food will come from," said Smith, who oversees the operation that cooks and distributes some 3,500 hot meals and distributes 500 food parcels a week from its base at Moseff House in Fox Hill.

"Anyone who needs food can come to us. We

never want to see anyone go hungry," he said.

Former President of the Bahamas China Friendship Association, Philip Simon brought the Network to the consulate's attention. Every year the Chinese Embassy seeks to support charitable works in The Bahamas.

"He told us about the organization's mission to provide food for the poor and we wanted to help," said Chinese Ambassador Huang Qinguo.

"Bilateral relations

exist not only between the two governments but also between our people. We would like the Bahamian people to feel the greetings and goodwill from the Chinese people as we head into the holiday season."

He added: "It is my great honor to present \$3,000 worth of food to the Bahamas Feeding Network to support the great cause of fighting against hunger."

Following the presentation, Smith led


Ambassador Qinguo on a brief tour of the organization's facilities. Inside the humble building more than a dozen volunteers worked in harmony packing food parcels and loaded vans with hot meals to distribute through a web of non-profit organisations of churches, soup kitchens and other feeding programs.

Bahamas Feeding Network is the brainchild of His Excellency Frank J Crothers, Ambassador of the Sovereign Military

Hospitaller Order of St John of Jerusalem of Rhodes and Malta. Launched in 2013, the Bahamas Feeding Network commenced operation preparing around 450 fresh meals and distributing around 50 food parcels to its feeding partners. To date, the Bahamas Feeding Network has distributed more than \$450,000 in food vouchers to those in need. This year alone the organization has made and shared 182,000 meals.

The little one is absolutely correct!


Babes and suckling sometimes know precisely what time it is!

All Those Sufferers

First, the news: WORKS Minister Desmond Bannister revealed yesterday that 5,412 households across the country are “off the grid,” as a result of not paying energy bills for 60 days or more and collectively owe Bahamas Power and Light more than \$5m.

The Minister also explained: “...For the last 20 years or so, many of our brothers and sisters have been off the grid. And that is a challenge. That is a challenge whether it is 6,000 or whether it is one. One or two are off the grid is a concern for all of us...”

Yes, he did also claim as we echo: One or two are off the grid is a concern for all of us!

Quite frankly, Sir, we do not believe you when you talk with such apparent sympathy about the one or two who might come to your attention as regards their inability to cough up the money BPL wishes from them.

Indeed, Sir, we are absolutely convinced that, instead of chatting about the problem we all face with a monopoly that either cannot or will not deliver the goods, you should be about the real business of demanding better from BPL.

In truth, however: We have now reached that point where instead of providing viable solutions to the problems now being faced by the people, highly paid and similarly regarded ministers in the new administration now seem obliged to pore over the problem they face and [with that done] they bombard the people with statistics.

A most wonderful example of this kind of ‘non-dealing’ with the people’s business can be found embedded in some of that stuff, the Hon. Minister of Works, Desmond Bannister recently dished up in the House of Assembly as he spoke on and on and on regarding BPL’s parlous fiscal state.

For the sake of the record, we dive into some of Bannister’s long-winded litany.

And thus [as the Minister of Works reported: “...“Since about 2004/2005, BPL has been (saddled) with a legacy debt. That legacy debt has reached \$500m. The reality is, this is a company that has been saddled with huge debts...It

has been a tradition by successive administrations for respective ministries to not pay BPL in a timely manner...”

And he also reported that: “...BPL has normally been left in arrears from anywhere between \$90 and \$100m annually due to business practices; [that] in addition to the longstanding sums of millions owed by consumers.

Bannister also revealed that BPL had balances in receivables of \$91,796,126.

Echo croaks: BPL had balances in receivables of \$91,796,126!

That’s right: NINETY ONE MILLION DOLLARS+ ALMOST ONE MILLION MORE DOLLARS!

Come on brother, your own litany of BPL’s myriad of failures gives the lie to such maladroitness rhetoric.

As you would recall, Sir, you said: There are 4,639 households without power in New Providence; in Abaco, there are 58 consumers without electricity; in Acklins with a combined balance of \$36,353.35; 85 in Bimini with a combined balance \$136,040.93; 66 in Cat Island with a combined balance of \$34,342.43; six in Crooked Island with a combined balance of \$13,265.25;

88 in Eleuthera with a combined balance of \$113,778.75; 14 in Exuma with a combined balance of \$8,108.05; 11 in Great Harbour Cay with a combined balance of \$9,349.10; 52 in Inagua with a combined balance of \$311,200.15; and 36 in San Salvador with a combined balance of \$16,576.65; in North Andros there are 132 disconnected patrons holding a combined balance of \$128,393; 116 in Central Andros holding a combined balance of \$153,458.92; 19 in Mangrove Cay with a combine balance of \$11,840.85 and 77 in South Andros holding a combined balance of \$80,464.72.

In total, then: These accounts owe Bahamas Power and Light approximately \$5,393,857.50.

In other words, they who suffer do their suffering thing throughout the length and breadth of this Commonwealth of The Bahamas.
