Acting Chief Justice Laments "Tenuous Position"

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over the ceremony in an Acting Chief Justice capacity.

Acting Chief Justice Watkins on Wednesday, said the "tenuous position" presented a challenge to set an agenda for the year.

"The late Chief Justice Isaacs became chief justice in July of 2018, sadly he passed away, just a few weeks later.

"The fact that there was no appointment of a

Chief Justice for a period of eight months, last year, together with the untimely passing of the former Chief Justice Isaacs, and the fact that the judiciary is still without a substantive Chief Justice has been a tremendous challenge, as it is difficult for the judiciary to make any long term plans for the future," Mrs. Watkins said.

Mrs. Watkins was appointed to the Acting Chief Justice position on September 3, 2018.

"The undisputable fact is that while it may be so that I am sitting in this chair as Acting Chief Justice at this moment, I am not certain as to whether I will be sitting in this chair later on today.

"I am not certain as to whether I will be sitting in this chair tomorrow morning.

"As the result of the tenuous position in which I find myself, it may be a futile exercise to make any long-term plans for the judiciary,

as the saying goes, 'I live or I work from day to day'," Mrs. Watkins said.

The shortage of staffing of both judges and clerks is also a major concern for Mrs. Watkins.

President of the Bahamas Bar Association, Kahlil Parker, also complained that a substantive Chief Justice is needed, stating that "the proliferation of acting judicial appointments has a deleterious effect on both the per-

ceived and the actual independence of the judiciary, which compromises its ability to function as a check and balance against the other two branches of our government.

"The Bahamas Bar Association will not silently abide the invisible tether which your and the other acting appointments represent, and represented, upon our Chief Justice and other justices of the Supreme Court and Court of Appeal.

"While it appears that some may not appreciate why this is important, they ought reasonably to be guided by those of us who do understand," Mr. Parker said.

Prior to the appointment of the late Chief Justice Isaacs, in July last year, the last substantive Chief Justice was Sir Hartman Longley, who was appointed in 2015, he was later appointed and sworn in as the President of the Court of Appeal in December 2017.

what The Bahamas proposes regarding goods and services.

Mr. Laing outlined the issues as follows: "One, sensitive agriculture and manufacturing that are produced in this country have higher proposed rates than the currently applied rates, representing a number of instances of what we called tariffing of existing support programs."

"Two, the average rate of duty will drop from 32

percent or thereabout to 15 per cent. So, if you take all the duty, add them up and divide them by the eight plus thousand lines. You should get an average rate of about 15 per cent. Third, that there are any number of instances that tariff is maintained," he said.

According to Mr. Laing, the Bahamas' offer closely mirrors its current national investment policy, stressing that there are a number of benefits to joining the WTO, one of which is economic

growth.

"Our own economic modelling suggests that because of the transparencies that get created in a WTO commitment by a country, because of the modernizing of your business legislation and environment, there has tended to be a up to 2 per cent growth in the economy of an exceeding country for up to 5 years.

"Even if the economy slows after that five years, the growth that took place in that economy doesn't shrink thereafter," he said.

As it relates to challenges The Bahamas would face if the decision is made to joining the WTO, Mr. Laing said there's no issue Bahamians face concerning WTO accession that cannot be addressed.

"If you are a country where your government is dependent on custom duties for revenue, then if you are lowering duties for a WTO accession, that means that there's a certain amount of money the government will lose, which presumably if it

doesn't want to run a larger deficit, it has to make up and so how the government does that is the challenge that has to be met.

"Secondly, if you're lowering custom duties on imports and you have a local manufacturer who is competing with that import, then that local manufacturer would face added price competitive pressures and so how do you respond to that disadvantage might accrue to that local manufacturer, that's a challenge," he said.

Also facing similar challenges, he said would be those in the agricultural sector who may feel additional pressures relating to duties being lowered.

The final draft of the offer's to be completed by the end of the month.

Meanwhile, a small demonstration was held in Rawson Square, Bay Street, yesterday by Bahamians who are calling on the government to hold a referendum for the people to determine the country's involvement with WTO.

addressed a recent attack on a prosecutor from the office of the Director of Public Prosecutions earlier this week.

The prosecutor, according to the police, was attacked and stabbed at an establishment.

Mr. Parker, commending earlier comments made by Attorney General, Senator Carl Bethel, said that more needs to be done.

"While we remember those of us who discharge the solemn function as

prosecutors before the Criminal Courts, who do their duty in the face of ever-present dangers, I must also lament the fact that we all as attorneys stand in the breach as a matter of course, and we all bear the burden of the results of litigation and other contentious matters.

"This assault on our brother has made manifest the fact that the time for debate has passed and that meaningful action is required. I commend the Attorney General for his timely remarks and acknowledgment of the

gravity of this situation.

"I admonish both the Attorney General and the Director of Public Prosecutions to ensure that substantive measures are taken immediately to protect our members", Mr. Parker said.

In his address at the ceremony, Mr. Bethel said that the physical safety of the judiciary is of utmost importance.

"I wish to reemphasize that the office of the Attorney General takes the question of the physical safety of all persons involved in the adminis-

tration of justice with utmost seriousness, inclusive of all members of the judiciary and our prosecutors.

"If there are any apparent deficiencies, one need only inform my office and we will immediately seek to assist in addressing any such issues," Mr Bethel said.

Assistant Commissioner of Police Clayton Fernander confirmed that two men were in custody being questioned in connection with the matter, having turned themselves in.

As the Commissioner initially explained, officers wearing them will not be able to alter the images, which are to be downloaded at a different location.

In accordance with the Real Property Tax Act, Chapter 375 as amended, the Chief Valuation Officer hereby gives notice:-

- (a) that copies of the assessment lists are available as required by Section 7 subsection 7 of the Act, and may be inspected at the Office of the Chief Valuation Officer;
- (b) that a notice of assessment addressed to each owner of property liable to tax under the Real Property Tax Act is available at the Valuation Office, located at rear of the shops at Carmichael Plaza, Carmichael Road and may be collected therefrom by or on behalf of the owner of such property during normal working hours;
- (c) that pursuant to subsection (3) of Section 7 of the Act, upon the expiration of five days after the publication of this notice, a notice of assessment shall be deemed to have been served on every owner of property liable to tax under the Act;
- (d) that without prejudice to the provision of subsection (3) of Section 7 of the Act, the Chief Valuation Officer may at any time after the publication in the Gazette of this notice send by post, a notice of assessment addressed to any owner of property liable to tax under the Act;
- (e) that pursuant to Section 11(1) of the Act, any person aggrieved by a notice of assessment deemed to have been served under this Act may object thereto by serving on the Chief Valuation Officer within thirty days after the date on which the notice of assessment is deemed to have been served, a notice in writing of such objection stating the grounds upon which he relies;
- (f) that pursuant to Section 18 of the Act, the tax is due and payable by the owners of property not later than sixty days after the date on which notice of assessment is deemed to have been served. Accordingly, it is the duty of each taxpayer to ensure that he receives a Notice of Assessment;
- (g) that the exemption has been allowed for 2019 on those which have been declared as owner-occupied residences, and have satisfied the conditions. However, under Section 43 of the Act, the owners are required to disclose to the Chief Valuation Officer any change in the circumstances which does not entitle the property for the exemption allowed;
- (h) that pursuant to Section 10 of the Act, every owner of property shall not later than the thirty-first day of December in each year, make to the Chief Valuation Officer in the prescribed form a return of such particulars of that property as may be prescribed, for the purpose of enabling that Officer to compile and maintain accurate assessment lists, and such owner shall declare to the correctness of such return before an authorized person.

Hon. Hubert Ingraham and the Hon. Perry Christie; Cabinet Ministers, Senators, Members of Parliament, and other high level officials.

Majority Rule Day became a public holiday in 2014. It commemorates The Bahamas gaining majority rule for the first time on January 10, 1967, symbolizing the promise of equality, a level playing field, and fair play for all Bahamians.

In his Majority Rule Day Message, the Prime Minister underscored the importance of commemorating and celebrating the historic event.

"We remember the long struggle for human dignity, equality and social justice, culminating in a new birth of freedom in The Bahamas," he said. "We remember our national heroes and the many others who offered their serv-

ice and sacrifice to create a new and more democratic Bahamas."

Members of the Bahamas Christian Council participated in the service through scripture reading, delivering the invocation, citing a statement of purpose and offering up intercessional prayers. The congregation joined in with singing of hymns -- How Great Thou Art, Lift Every Voice and Sing (which is regarded as "The Black National Anthem"), and Great is Thy Faithfulness.

Reverend Fr. Kendrick Forbes, Vicar General of the Catholic Archdiocese, delivered the Homily, calling on Bahamians to recommit to the task of nation building, which is the vision of the country's forefathers.

The service ended with the singing of the National Anthem -- March On Bahamaland -- and reciting of the Pledge of Allegiance.

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that was recovered in southeastern New Providence.

According to police reports, the first incident of seizure took place shortly after 8:00pm Wednesday when Drug Enforcement Officers, acting on intelligence, went to a residence on St.

Bart's Road, Golden Gates.

Upon arrival, officers met a male standing near a white van. Seeing the officers the male ran from the yard, and escaped the police.

Officers conducted a search of the van and recovered 19 crocus sacks and one taped package with suspected marijuana, weighing in at

545 pounds, with an estimated street value of \$545,000.00.

Two men who were also at the residence, at the time of the search, were taken into police custody.

They are expected to appear before a magistrate court next week to be formally charged.

In separate incident, about an hour later,

according to reports, DEU officers, again acting on information, conducted a search of a property at Williams Drive, off Cowpen Road, around 9pm and discovered behind a building 26 crocus sacks and a cooler containing 656 pounds of suspected marijuana.

The drugs, according to police, have an esti-

mated street value of \$656,000.00.

Police said no arrest was made in this incident. Investigations are ongoing.

Police are also investigating the circumstances surrounding a stabbing incident, which has left a 22-year-old female in hospital.

According to the police shortly after

1:00am Wednesday, a group of women were at a residence on Malcolm Road, when they got into an altercation, resulting in one of the women being stabbed to the body.

The victim was transported to hospital, where her condition is listed as stable. Investigations are ongoing.

“...let my people go...”

I, Felix Frederick Bethel hereby claim family connection to each and every human being on this planet; and thus, I now share the sad story of how it came to be that, my cousin, The Honourable Arthur William Hodge, Esq., graduate of Oriel College, Oxford ---a man of immense good manners whipped my cousin Prosper to death.

And now, hear ye, my brothers and sisters Cousin Arthur William [a white slave owner] whipped my cousin Nobody Prosper to death!

I read somewhere that after the sting of Hodge's whip: It wasn't long before Prosper's head fell back.

As I recently discovered, Hodge, the white, scum-bag/ man/master addressed the jury as follows:-- “Gentleman, As bad as I have been represented, or as bad as you may think me, I assure you, that I feel support in my affliction from entertaining a proper sense of religion. As all men are subject to wrong, I cannot but say that that principle is likewise inherent in me. I acknowledge myself guilty in regard to many of my slaves; but I call God to witness my innocence in respect of the murder of Prosp...I am sensible that the country thirsts for my blood, and I am ready to sacrifice it...”

And thus, I read: It wasn't long before Prosper's head fell back. No moans or wails could be heard from him, who

was now barely human, but more just strips of hanging flesh. Prosper was dragged to the sick house and chained to two other negro slaves.

The sick house was nothing more than a filthy hot boarded up hut where slaves were chained to the dirt ground. Either they recovered from the beatings or whatever disease had inflicted them, or they died in chains.

After five days, unable to take the stench of Prosper's rotting flesh, while he still drew laboured breaths, the two slaves chained to him, broke away.

When Prosper was found, not a piece of black flesh could be seen. The maggots had eaten him before he even died.

Note also that: Stephen M'Keogh, a white man, who had lived as manager on the Mr Hodge's estate, deposed, that he saw the deceased Prosper after he had been so severely flogged; that he could put his finger in his side; he saw him some days before his death in a cruel state; he could not go near him for the blue flies.



And for sure, I read: “...When Prosper was found, not a piece of black flesh could be seen. The maggots had eaten him before he even died...”
