#### Customs Fraud Fighting Initiative Launched

The Bahamas Customs Department and Deputy Prime Minister Peter Turnquest introduced the new online portal Click2 Clear, which is designed to protect against customs fraud.

During a press conference on Wednesday at the Ministry of Finance, they laid out the government's public education campaign to unveil this latest initiative.

In addition to protecting against fraud, the por-

tal will provide faster customs clearance, automatic email confirmation and online payments.

Turnquest believes the portal is a way to ensure a more effective system.

"Once Click2Clear is fully implemented, all importers will be operating by the same rules and regulations. This is possible because most processes will be digitized and automated. That means they won't vary from one customs officer to the next or one port of entry to the

# TYA President Confident in Gov't Job Training Approach

With youth unemployment still relatively high, the Free National Movement's Torchbearers Youth Association (TYA) President Carlyle Bethel believes it's now time to approach the problem in a different way, which he said the Minnis administration is doing.

"The youth unemployment numbers have historically been high and it's been a challenge for successive governments," Bethel said.

"I think what the government is doing is they're approaching it from a different angle this time and that is not just trying to provide short term jobs [in] the 52 week programme, but they are trying to build skills among young people so that even if they happen to

not be able to find a job they can still get a job and complete a job and complete a task and do it well and have a long term sustainable form of income.

"And, so I think that those signs and those things will pay off in the long run and I think that's very encouraging for us."

When asked about the overall decrease in unemployment figures, the TYA president credited the government with doing much to diversify not just employment for young people, but building young entrepreneurs.

"When we look at the labour numbers, we would have seen that the recent numbers would have shown that unemployment is at its lowest in 10 years. With that being said, the government is doing a lot to diversify not just employment for young people,

but to build entrepreneurs throughout the country," Bethel said.

"We see the implementation of programmes like the Small Business Development Center, the Be Your Own Boss Scholarship, at BTVI, which helps those students who graduate BTVI with trades to then start their own business in their particular trade.

"So, all these things combined together are what I believe is contributing to the decrease in the unemployment numbers to its lowest in 10 years.

"That's very encouraging for us. I think it's very encouraging for the country and I think it shows exactly the good that the government is doing."

The TYA president said these are signs that will pay off in the long run as more and more people are

#### Gov't Discusses Potential Minimum Wage Increase

Minister of Labour Dion Foulkes told reporters earlier this week that discussions are taking place concerning a raise in minimum wage.

This followed countless complaints of the high cost of living in The Bahamas, considering the 60 percent increase in value added tax from 7.5 per cent to 12 percent.

He said, "There is a discussion at the tripartite council level. However, there hasn't been any definitive recommendation at this point."

In 2015, the government of The Bahamas raised minimum wage from \$150 per week to \$210 per week to offset

Last year, ahead of the VAT increase, Deputy Prime Minister and Minister of Finance Peter Turnquest told reporters that an increase in wages will be an extra expense on businesses that will potentially lead to an increase in products and services.

#### Beekeeper's Warning to Prevent Bee Attack

A local beekeeper yesterday advised residents in the capital to take proper care of the boxing on their homes, as it will prevent bees from forming hives.

Barry Forbes said, "If you have at least one eighth on an inch open in your boxing that leaves room for them to scout and to get there."

In the wake of last week's bee attack, which left and an 82-year-old man dead in Grand Bahama, Mr. Forbes said he has suspected that bees in the country are Africanized, considering their aggressive behavior.

He said, "When I look at that situation in Freeport, they were agitated. I mean any bee can pretty much kill you, but the amount of bees that killed that man leads me to believe that they are definitely African Killer Bees."

Bahamas National Trust (BNT) Executive Director Eric Carey told The Bahama Journal that while aggressive behavior in bees is rare in the capital, he suggests contacting the Department of Agriculture if someone encounters a swarm.

He said, "The bees in Grand Bahama are displaying a type of behavior that is very aggressive, which is usually not seen in the European traditional honey bee."

Mr. Carey said BNT has been in touch with the Ministry of Agriculture and Marine Resources, the Grand Bahama Port Authority and the Ministry of Environmental Health on the matter.

He added, "There is some speculation that there may be some form of hybridized Africanized bee."

He also said BNT recommended that the government try and get some definitive analysis of the species involved in the attack because this is not the first occurrence on that island.

In fact, last month BNT issued a warning following an attack on a few of its team members conducting bird surveys in East Grand Bahama.

Data from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention found that the number of deaths from hornet, wasp and bee stings have hit their highest totals since 2005.

The CDC reported that there were a total of 1,109 deaths from a hornet, wasp, or bee sting.

The totals amount to an average of 62 deaths each year.

However, in 2017, which was the latest year with data, there were 89 deaths and approximately 80 percent of deaths were among males.

temporary plan to mitigate its shortfall in generation.

"It is expected to provide relief to residents as soon as possible," Dr. Minnis said yesterday. "In support, an additional nine megawatts of power from Aggreko units are expected to be returned to service."

He added that a six-

man team of specialists from Philadelphia Gear is in New Providence assisting with the matter.

"The team has started working with the intention of returning an additional 20 megawatts of power to service at the Baillou Hill Power Plant," Dr. Minnis said.

Philadelphia Gear designs and manufactures power transmission equip-

ment and gears.

BPL's peak demand is 250 megawatts and is currently experiencing a 40 megawatt shortfall.

The prime minister noted that on Tuesday Cabinet ministers met with BPL executives and board members to discuss the unacceptable state of power generation in New Providence.

"Over the last several

months, BPL has had to engage in prolonged periods of load shedding, due to a decaying generation fleet that has presented challenges to power generation in New Providence for decades,"

"I am deeply unhappy that our families are suffering. I fully understand that Bahamians and residents want clear and

he explained.

immediate action.

"I want to assure you that the government is committed to doing whatever is necessary to alleviate this problem, including further additional measures.

"The frustration and inconvenience experienced by Bahamians and residents, in homes and in businesses throughout New Providence is simply

unacceptable.

"We are doing all we can to fix this problem long-term, and to ensure that Bahamians and residents receive the consistent power supply that they deserve."

As part of the longterm solution, work has already begun on a 132megawatt power plant in New Providence.

mately the prime minister must share the shame and the blame for their failures," Mitchell said yesterday.

He pointed out that PLP Leader Philip Davis delivered the same message to Prime Minister Dr. Hubert Minnis on Monday.

"People are so fed up with this government and the lights going off, that they are being pushed to the brink of social disorder and massive civic protests. The PLP will support these lawful protests if there is no action taken to solve this crisis," Mitchell said.

"We warn the FNM that this time their clever PR tricks won't work. Try as they may, this story has nothing to do with the PLP. This is about those who have the superintendence of BPL today: the FNM.

"Had they followed the plans left in place by the PLP we would not be experiencing these challenges. You don't have to take our word for it as this assertion is buttressed by the statement from the Chamber of Commerce today.

"Beyond that, if the FNM government had even followed the plan of the Osbourne led BPL board, the problems now being experienced may not now be as excruciating."

He said, instead, the Free National Movement continues to blame the PLP and try to spin clever stories about who is at fault in this matter.

"This is not about Leslie Miller or Philip Brave Davis. This is about the abject failures of the Donavan Moxey led board, the poor service by Whitney Heastie, and the hopeless, hapless political leadership of Desmond Bannister and Hubert Minnis," Mitchell said.

"The Bahamian people see the stewardship of BPL by that FNM crew as an utter failure. They came to office promising to save The Bahamas, but cannot keep the lights on. We are 50 miles away

from the richest, most powerful nation in the world and we cannot keep the lights on for 400,000 people. It is a shame and disgrace.

"No matter how the FNM, their surrogates and media friends try to excuse the FNM on the abject failure and mismanagement of BPL by using the worn out and tired line that it's the PLP's fault, the BPL crisis is not about the PLP or Leslie Miller, but about the prime minister who

messed up badly and BPL

is near collapse, creating the current crisis."

According to the PLP chairman, the current Minnis administration's contrived plan is to blame for this current energy crisis and the prime minister and his government must be held accountable for his poor decisions.

added that the government is working diligently on the matter.

"We anticipate, based upon the information that was given to us, that we will have a relatively short resolution to the matter barring any other significant events and so hopefully this saga, if we can call it that, can end," Mr. Turnquest assured.

When asked if the BPL load shedding is a national crisis, Turnquest said he

wouldn't put a label on it.

"We know that this is a very significant inconvenience for citizens and residence and the inconvenience they have to endure during this period," he

When questioned about BPL being privatized, the deputy prime minister said there were no discussions on the matter, but he would defer to the minister of works and BPL.

As for the government allegedly allocating funds for maintenance repairs,

but were used for new engines at Clifton Pier, Turnquest said he is not aware if that is what the funds were used for, but admits he is not in charge of those funds. He deferred again to BPL on the matter.

Load shedding continues throughout New Providence and on Sunday during a press conference, BPL CEO Whitney Heastie was unable to guarantee whether load shedding would stop.

2018 and January 31, 2019.

Reyes is alleged to have exploited a woman during the time frame in question.

It is further alleged that between December 16, 2018 and January 31, 2019, she unlawfully withheld the identification papers of her victim.

She pleaded not guilty to all three charges and was denied bail and opted to have her trial heard in the Magistrate's Court.

She was subsequently remanded to the Bahamas Department of Corrections until August 21 at which time she will have a status hearing.

According to court

papers, 11 witnesses appear on the docket – the majority of them police officers.

The U.S. Department of State's 2019 trafficking in persons report found that The Bahamas maintains its tier one ranking. This, considering it continues to demonstrate "serious and sustained" efforts to combat trafficking.

next," Turnquest said.

"We will have tighter controls and risk management to reduce the opportunities of corruption and fraud, including the ability to transition to a cashless environment.

"The benefits of this transformation are numerous, as the government will have accurate statistical information for more effective policy

making and real time information to assist with better budget planning."

Superintendent Tyrone Sands made it clear that anyone who needs to register, whether a resident or not, must register online.

Persons who should register include individuals who shop online, send or receive documents internationally or use a broker or freight forwarder to import goods.

"Once your name appears on a manifest, your name must be in the system for those works to be cleared. This is why it is imperative that you register," Superintendent Sands warned.

"We just want to stress the importance of being proactive. Register now. This is August. Thanksgiving will soon be here. Christmas will soon be here. You'll be ordering gifts and presents online. Do not wait until you place that order. The goods are at a customs port and then you find you did not register and your name is not in the system."

Registration can be done online at www.click2clear.gov.bs.

A hotline is also available for persons in need of assistance. Residents will need a National

Insurance Board Smart Card to register.

Other features of Click2Clear include the business trade portal and the pleasure vessel clearance portal, which is an online module for pleasure vessels to clear customs and apply for mandatory cruising and fishing permits.

Another feature to look out for next year is a mobile app.

The Bahamas

Customs Department is currently collaborating with a local software developer to launch the mobile app, Exempt App, for customs declarations at baggage claim to be paperless.

The system will be in place September 1 and everyone must register online by September 30.

So far, 5,000 persons mainly from the Family Islands have already registered.
