Let us continue to build a future where everyone has an opportunity to rise, regardless of gender, background, or circumstance.

Once again, I thank the Jones Communication Network, for this recognition and for valuing the principles of service, leadership, and character. And finally, I would like to say thank you to those individuals who inspire change daily through their dedication and selflessness. Let us continue working together to create a brighter, safer, and more united Bahamas.



It is from the heart that our attitudes, intentions and behaviour flow.


It is the repository of good and evil, love and hate — the place where we most need the Divine's touch.

It was important for me to be here today as we celebrate an extraordinary woman, a trailblazer, and someone who has made all of us incredibly proud—CommissionerShanta

Today, we honor her remarkable journey and reflect on the values that make her story so inspiring to us all.

I would like to take a moment to publicly thank JCN for the invitation to share in this moment with you, and for consistently providing the Person of the Year Awards as a platform for celebrating Bahamian greatness.

There are many giants among us worthy of recognition -I am a believer that Bahamian excellence is all around us. And JCN provides us an opportunity to come together in ways that we rarely do to recognise the achievements of great Bahamian men and women, like Shanta Knowles, who have made meaningful and indelible contributions to our society.

I applaud the entire JCN team for its efforts to honour our great nation builders. Growing up on Cat Island, I learned early that where you start does not have to define where you finish. Life was simple, and resources limited, but my grandparents taught me that faith, hard work, and humility can take you places you never could imagine. Commissioner Knowles's journey reflects that sametruth, reminding us of what is possible when determination and opportunity meet.

Shanta's story began in Rock Sound, Eleuthera, in a close-knit community that nurtured her values and shaped her character. At 15, she had an encounter that changed her life. She met Mrs. Allerdyce Strachan, the first female gazetted officer in the Royal Bahamas Police Force. For a young girl from a small settlement, seeing someone from her own community achieve something so remarkable was life-changing. It gave her the courage to dream bigger, to see herself in a leadership role, and to believe that anything was possible.

In 1990, Shanta left the comfort of Eleuthera and moved to New Providence to join the Police College. That leap of faith was not easy, but she approached it with courage and an unwavering sense of purpose. Over the years, she climbed the ranks, from her early days in the Southern Division to her groundbreaking leadership at the Criminal Investigations Department, where she became the first woman to lead.

There's a moment in her career that stands out to me. When the former Commissioner asked his senior officers who was ready to take on the challenging role of leading the Northern Bahamas, only Shanta stepped forward. She didn't hesitate. She answered the call because that's the kind of leader she is—someone who embraces responsibility and leads with courage and confidence. Who does not run away from responsibility but towards it.

Her leadership has been defined by her commitment to serving others. She has dedicated her career to fighting for justice, helping victims of crime, and strengthening communities across The Bahamas. She is more than a leader; she is a role model for every young Bahamian girl who dares to dream of a future filled with possibility.






